

Thank You Saratoga County Board of Supervisors

Saratoga County officials announced Tuesday that the Saratoga County History Center was awarded \$25,000 from the Saratoga County non-profit COVID relief grant fund. The Saratoga County Board of Supervisors created the fund to assist community non-profits negatively impacted by the pandemic that continue to experience challenges.

Town of Moreau Supervisor and Saratoga County Board of Supervisors Chair Theodore T. Kusnierz, Jr. said, "Our non-profits have been hit hard by the COVID pandemic and many are still feeling the effects of the statewide economic shutdown. Saratoga County understands the wideranging benefits the local non-profit community provide to our residents and the value of their economic impact in our County. This grant program will help them continue their important and beneficial work right here in Saratoga County."

The Saratoga County History Center is very appreciative of the support from the Board of Supervisors. The History Center Board has identified the need for an immersive, professionallydesigned and constructed exhibit on the county's history as a priority. Work has started on the planning for the project in the form of recruiting subject matter experts who are volunteering their time to work on the script/labels for the exhibit and identifying objects, photographs and documents to include in the display. Such an exhibit is a challenge and something SCHC has never undertaken, but it's one that will have a lifespan of at least a decade. It will provide residents and visitors with an interesting orientation to the history of the county and provide a backdrop for the development of new public and school programs.

July 9 - 2pm **Solomon Northup Scripter Award Presentation.** In Support of the current Black History exhibit at Brookside Museum, Melissa Howell, a Solomon Northup descendant, has loaned the Scripter Award, presented on behalf of Solomon Northup by the University of Southern California, to the Saratoga County History Center, along with other memorabilia to be displayed. The Award honors Northup and recognizes the work of screenwriter, John Ridley, who wrote the script for the 2013 movie *12 Years a Slave*. Ms. Howell will present the award along with a talk entitled "Embracing the Legacy of Solomon Northup."The event is hosted by and held at the Brookside Museum. July 12 - 7pm New Light on Saratoga's Indigenous Past. Professor Karim Tiro, of Xavier University, Cincinnati, OH is completing a study commissioned by the National Park Service to better understand Saratoga's Native past. He will share findings about Saratoga's origins as a fishing station and religious mission; the Oneida refugees at Wilton during the American Revolution; and Atiatoharongwen, a Saratoga-born Mohawk man of Black and Abenaki parentage whom Washington referred to as a friend. Dr. Tiro is a historian specializing in North America from the 16th through the 19th centuries. The event is hosted by and held at the Brookside Museum.

July 14 - 7pm *Off The Northway* Presentation and Book Signing. Local journalist Stephen William will talk about the long rollercoaster history of the dream, design, negotiations for, and construction of the \$15 billion GlobalFoundries semiconductor facility in Malta. He will also sign copies of Off the Northway, a compilation of 83 articles written by Steve from 2005 through 2020 for the Daily Gazette in Schenectady, NY. The Off the Northway book will be available for purchase at \$20. The event is sponsored by and proceeds to benefit the Saratoga County History Center. The event will be held at the David R. Meager Malta Community Center at 1 Bayberry Dr, Ballston Spa, NY 12020

The Saratoga County History Center will host a series of guided walking tours led by local historians during the summer and fall months throughout Saratoga County. The tours will be offered bi-weekly from mid-July through the end of September on various days and times.

"The tours will offer a unique opportunity to interact with several historians with a deep knowledge of the history of their communities," said Jim Richmond, tour coordinator for the History Center. "The tours are designed to explore little-known areas of Saratoga County often overlooked by both residents and visitors."

Six visits are currently scheduled. Registration for the tours can be made two weeks in advance at the History Center website https://brooksidemuseum.org/ A suggested donation of \$10 per registration (individuals, couples, or families) will support the programs of the History Center or a not-for-profit organization chosen by the tour leaders.

Monday, July 18, 2pm – Exploring the Old Hotels of Ballston Spa. Ann Clothier, History Center, and Dave Waite, local historian. Meet at Brookside Museum in Ballston Spa. Distance under a mile.

Thursday, August 4, 4pm – Schuyler's Saratoga. Sean Kelleher, Saratoga Town Historian. Meet at Schuylerville Veterans Memorial Park. US 4 and NY 32 adjacent to Fish Creek. Distance 1 mile.

Monday, August 15, 10am—Zim Smith Trail in Round Lake. Lauren Roberts, Saratoga County Historian. Meet at the Zim Smith parking lot at 3 Curry Road in Round Lake. Distance under a mile.

Wednesday, August 31, 10am – Forest Park Amusement Park. Rick Reynolds, Ballston Town Historian. Meet at 62 West Side Drive, Ballston Lake. Distance 1 mile.

Saturday, September 17, 10am – Vischer Ferry Historic District. John Scherer, Clifton Park Town Historian. Meet at parking area at the end of Ferry Drive, Vischer Ferry. Distance 1.5 miles.

Thursday, September 29, 1 pm – The Champlain Canal, Waterford. Russ VanDervoort, Waterford Town Historian. Meet at Lock 2 Park in Waterford. Distance 1.5 miles.

Detailed information on individual visits, directions and parking will be available on the website and community event calendars prior to each visit. To accommodate walkers of all capacities, guided tours are planned over distances of 1 to 1.5 miles, mostly in flat terrain.

June 8 - 6:30pm "The Capital Region's Role in the U.S.S. Monitor." The Waterford Historical Museum and Cultural Center is offering another outdoor lecture. Historian Michael Barrett will be presenting a fun and educational lecture on "The Capital Region's Role in the U.S.S. Monitor." Two Capital District industrialists are credited with convincing the Navy to take on John Ericcson's idea of an iron clad floating battery as an answer to the rumored Confederate ironclad warship. Troy and Schenectady foundries made most of the iron for the Monitor, and a Troy man served on board during the world famous first-ever clash of iron warships. Lectures are picnic-style programs. They are bring-your-own-chair and

bring-your-own-refreshments to enjoy out on the museum's front lawn.

Lecture starts at 6:30pm. Admission: \$10 a person

August 4 - 12pm "Iron-Hearted: The 115th NYS Vol. Regiment in the Civil War." During the Civil War, Colonel Simeon Sammons received authority to recruit a regiment in the counties of

Fulton, Hamilton, Montgomery, and Saratoga, with headquarters at Fonda. On August 26, 1862, it mustered into the service of the United States for three years. Join local historian David Brooks in an exploration of the history of the "Iron-Hearted Regiment." Journey along with them from Upstate NY to the Deep South and back. Discover the battles they faced on the front line and those experienced from within. This event will be held ourtoors, weather permitting, on the library's "porch." In case of rain, we will convene in the Community Room on the main floor. David Brooks is the Education Director at Schoharie Crossing State Historic Site in Fort Hunter, N.Y. – but also sits on the board of the Fulton County Historical Society, based out of the Fulton County Museum in Gloversville, NY. As a native of that County, growing up, he heard tales of local history and how his own ancestors fought to preserve the Union during the tumultuous Civil War The Saratoga Springs Public Library is located at 49 Henry Street, Saratoga Springs, NY 12866-3271. News from the herb garden...

Knowing Saturday was going to be steamy, I arrived at the garden early. Task one: water the recently transplanted morning glories. Hose in hand, I aimed for the base of the arbor. The tendrils that had started to climb the lattice were now leafless stalks three-inch-high. Was the culprit the cottontail who had sprinted across the lawn as I rounded the corner of the museum or the deer whose footprints make clear they come for a nightly inspection? The "Court of Online Research" identify the rabbit as guilty. But the deer don't get off scot-free; they are responsible for "pruning the roses," blossoms, prickly stems, and all. These challenges are mere inconveniences, reminders that nature still reigns.



Gardening challenges were more serious for our ancestors. From the time the first colonists arrived in America to the beginning of market gardening in the mid-1800s, a family's well-being, even their very existence, depended on bountiful harvests from the garden. Enough produce had to be gathered in to sustain them through the long stretch from fall into late spring when early crops again could be harvested. Success depended on nature's whims—weather, plant diseases, insect infestations, and foraging animals. So I'm not complaining about the cottontail and the deer. I'll wait until the Japanese beetles appear.



This week's star of the garden is an evening primrose named "sundrops." Long ago this easy-togrow native "wildling" was adopted for cultivation in the garden. The plant attracts a variety of pollinators, especially bees and butterflies. Hummingbirds come for nectar and goldfinches devour the seeds. The pure, bright yellow blossoms glisten like miniature summer suns in the north-facing border of the fragrance bed. The woad, now in second bloom, echos the sundrops glow in the dyer bed. Yes, I think you would agree, the garden's rewards outnumber the setbacks.


