January 29 - 2pm "Wings of Victory: Aircraft Manufacturing in New York State During World War II" Historian Patrick Chaisson examines aircraft production in New York State during the Second World War, tracing the development of such legendary warbirds as the Grumman Hellcat and Republic Thunderbolt fighter planes and many of the lesser-known aviation companies who did their part to help win victory. February 19 - 2pm "The Lattimore Circle" by Julie O'Connor and Lorie Wies, both retired librarians with a deep interest in local Black History. This Saratoga County History Roundtable presentation on the saga of the Lattimore family over several generations in which they were key figures in the establishment of a viable and thriving Black community in Albany and became important links with the anti-slavery and abolition movements. They continued their influence after moving to the Town of Moreau and Saratoga Springs during the mid-19th century. The presentation will be held in the Long Room at the Brookside Museum to coincide with the "Black Experiences in Saratoga County, 1750-1950" exhibition. 
Seeking technical assistance with our virtual programming.

What book is on the nightstand?



We asked various local historians and history enthusiasts what history book has been their bedside table recently. As the pandemic continues, we hope you will want to find out what others are reading in these uncertain times and why. SCHC Board Secretary Donna Dardaris responded with.



I'm currently reading *The Alice Network* by Kate Quinn. It is a historical novel set immediately after WWII (1947) and the main story is ostensibly about a young American woman traveling to France to try to find her cousin who she has not heard from since the end of the war. But interwoven with that story is the story of another older English woman who accompanies her on her search for reasons of her own, which aren't immediately apparent. It soon becomes clear that the older woman was a spy for the English in France during WWI and has many demons of her own that she has been fighting for years. The book chapters alternate between one set in 1915 and one set in 1947 and gives a very realistic picture of what life was like for both women during the two world wars, painting a portrait of what each had to deal with and endure.

I chose this book to read based solely on the author – I recently read another book by Quinn, *The Rose Code*, as a member of the Saratoga League of Women Voters book club. That book was focused on the code breakers in England during WWII who deciphered the Enigma machine and the characters in the book are fictionalized versions of men and women who actually existed and were part of this endeavor. Again, Quinn is able to convey a real sense of what these individuals experienced and make the history of that era come alive for me.

Donna Dardaris is one of SCHC's most active supporters. She is included in all phases of the organization, including running many of fundraisers including our successful Holiday Artisan Market. If you see her at the museum make sure to say Hi and ask her about what she is reading.
